



US Vice President may visit Geneva for Iran deal talks

New signs of progress have emerged in the ongoing diplomatic talks between the United States and Iran. The Wall Street Journal has reported that US Vice President JD Vance may travel to Geneva to take part in the process of signing a possible memorandum of understanding.

The report says that if certain conditions related to Iran's nuclear activities are met, it could open the way for easing some of the sanctions imposed on Tehran. This is being considered a key part of the potential agreement.

According to sources, even after the signing of the memorandum, further technical discussions may still be required. For this reason, another round of meetings in Islamabad is also being considered in the future.

Meanwhile, Washington has concerns over the security situation in the Strait of Hormuz. US President Donald Trump is reportedly interested in discussing the issue with leaders of various countries to strengthen international coordination.

The report also notes that the return of Qatari representatives from Tehran after discussions on a recently revised draft proposal is being seen as a positive sign of progress in the negotiations.
